Four districts has been selected randomly from four agro- climatic zones of Brahmaputra valley, one from each- Jorhat from upper Brahmaputra valley. Morigaon from central Brahmaputra valley, Darrang from North Bank valley and Nalbari from lower Brahmaputra valley. From each district one Agricultural Development Officers (ADO) circle has been selected. From each of the selected ADO circle three villages has been selected keeping in view that represents various socio economic conditions. In the selected villages, the universe for the sampling consisted of total number of Fam household. From this universe 9 to 12 percent of the household has been selected at a percent of the household has been selected at the select selected at random. In this way a sample of 228 Farm household has interviewed. Appropriate statistical and econometric tools have been used to analyse the data. Livestock and Poultry Population and Trend in Assam

In India, the process of industrialization took a new turn from Gandhies Gandhian movement. From the ancient period, Indian villages were self sufficient. Whatever is required by the rural people is produced within the village and the surplus production is sent to the urban areas. urban areas and outside the country. 



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

Study on Fish Diversity of Barkana Beel, A Freshwater Wetland in Barpeta District, Assam

Dr. Rantu Mani Deka Department of Zoology, Barbhag College, Kalag, Nalbari, Assam, India

Abstract

The present paper deals with the study of fish diversity of Barkana beel. The investigation was carried out for the period of two years (i.e. 2015-2017). The study revealed 47 fish species belonging to 34 genera under 19 families indicating a rich fish diversity of the beel. Among the fish species Channa striata was found dominant resident species. The study showed maximum fish landing in the month of December and January of each year due to practice of 'Katal fishing' by the fishermen resulting large quantity of fish capture. During the month of April to May fish catch was found low due to higher water level. The dependent people overexploit the fish resources. The present study emphasized the need to apply some management strategy to sustain the beel ecosystem resources.

Key Words:- Barkana beel, Fish Diversity.

Introduction:- Wetlands provide tremendous economic benefits to mankind through production of various types of fishes. Beels are the natural source for supplying fish and provide employments to the fishermen population. India ranks 7th position among fish productivity nations of the world. Several workers studied about diversity. Among them Nayak and Mishra (2008), Das and Bardoloi (2012), Negi and Rajput (2012), Agarwal (2013), Lamsal et.al. (2014) and Abubakar et.al. (2015). In recent years the beel ecosystem is exploited for fishery resources. Therefore to find out the present status of fish diversity, the present study was undertaken in Barkana beel.

Materials and methods:- The study was conducted for a period of two years (2015-2017). Study was made by attending directly on the fishing spot of the beel, on the day of fishing. The fishes were collected from the fishing spot and preserved in formalin and brought to the laboratory for identification. Fish species were identified following Jayram (1981), Talwar and Jhigran (1991) and fishes were assorted according to their families.

Study area: - Barkana beel is a perennial wetland located in Barpeta district of lower Assam. Geographically it lies at the intersection of 26°152-26°302 N latitude and 91°02-91°152 E longitude and about 90 Km away towards west from the Guwahati, the capital of Assam. It is a floodplain wetland and occupies an area of about 248.42 Hectares and naturally fed by a channel locally known as Barirjan/ Bhojkhowa nala. The average annual maximum and minimum water temperature being 21°C and 31.5°C.

The present residents of the Char-Chapon (morror) areas of Assam are largely the descendents of the immunities Markon, whose forefathers were originally migrated from East Pakiston (Eastern-Bengal, and now Burgladed) during early 20° contary and later. These Bengali interigrants came from the Eastern Bengal districts, most particularly Mymon singh and Rougner of Bangladoh. This phenomena of Bougals immigration, also originated as a gift of the Herish rule in India, by means of importing labours, to most the demand of Parmus Amdone' i.e. cheap-labours. As those immigrant Muslims and their forefathers were mosely the farmers, they always prefer to live in the alluvial riserus arms. Agriculture is the chief means of Irvelihood of these Chie Chaperi dwellers, and their culture is also promedly their livelihood activities. These Muslems have their own traditional and customery behavioral patterns, rituals and festivals, faiths, beliefs, superstitions, art and enalls and have a unspar convention of preparing and consuming ricabased first current reflecting their first life and first culture. It is important to identify the unique elements of their Educookery and folk-cassing, some of which are also on the verge of disappearance.
